


- As a result of a growing need for healthcare services, the NHS has reported a workforce shortage of over 100,000 staff.
- The healthcare and social work sector employs over 1.6million people in the UK.
- Staff across the NHS are in contact with more than 1.5 million patients and their families every single day.



WHY HEALTHCARE & SOCIAL WORK?

There is a constant and evolving need for more workers within this sector. This makes the sector a very stable environment to build a career in. With it being such a crucial sector for society, there will always be a need for more individuals to fill positions. WHAT QUALIFICATIONS DO I NEED?



For certain non-specialised roles, such as a Domiciliary Care Assistant or GP Receptionist, often you need a minimum of five GCSEs at Grade C including English and Maths.

For nearly all specialised careers within the healthcare and social work sector, you will need a specific degree in the relevant subject for the role you wish to pursue.

Many universities will require specific A Levels (or equivalent) to be taken in order to be accepted on to the course. If you're interested in a career in this sector, it's a really good idea to plan ahead so you make the right GCSE and A Level subject choices.

For lots of degree programmes, such as Social Work, Youth Work, or Nursing, entry onto the degree course will include providing evidence of relevant work experience and/or volunteering.

It's important to check the entry requirements for the qualification you intend to pursue, to make sure you can plan ahead to meet the requirements.





WHAT SKILLS ARE USEFUL?

Beyond the qualifications needed to pursue a career in the healthcare and social work sector, employers will also look for various employability skills. Examples of skills and personal attributes that are useful to have to work in this sector include:

- Communication skills
- Interpersonal ('people') skills
- Ability to work in a team
- Ability to work under pressure
- Flexibility and adaptability
- Attention to detail

- Helpful and caring
- Emotional intelligence
- Empathy
- Strong work ethic
- Approachable
